(甲) One of the biggest problems the Olympic Games has faced in recent years has been drug-taking by athletes to **enhance** their performance. Two of the biggest controversies involved runners Ben Johnson and Marion Jones. Johnson won the men's 100 meters at the 1988 Games in Seoul, and Jones won three gold medals in women's events at the 2000 Sydney Games. Both were later found to have used performance-**enhancing** drugs, and were **stripped** of their medals. The most unusual case of drug-taking at the Olympics involved Cian O'Connor, competing in an equestrian (horse racing) event at the 2004 Athens Games. O'Connor won the event, but then had his medal **stripped** because officials found he had

given his horse performance-enhancing drugs!

Sports officials work tirelessly to test athletes for drug use. It is important to <u>stamp out</u> the use of these drugs from sports; otherwise, people will lose confidence in sports and might stop watching them. Some drugs are hard to find with the current drug tests. Therefore, sports officials are keeping samples of athletes' blood for use in the future. The officials feel that more advanced tests in the future might be able to detect drugs in these blood samples. This might help to deter people from cheating.

(\mathbb{Z}) In 1927, businessman Joe Thompson gave permission to one of his employees to sell
eggs, milk, and bread in one of his stores. Although there were many grocery stores and general
shops, Thompson believed that selling these products in the stores would make shopping more easily
for his customers. In 1928, Thompson started to train employees so that they would provide the same
quality and service in every store he owned. They were also asked to wear a uniform. During the
Great Depression, Thompson's company went bankrupt. However, he managed to keep the company
running by borrowing money. In 1946, the name of the stores was changed to 7-Eleven to reflect the
stores' new business hours (7 am to 11 pm), which was new at the time. In 1963, a 7-Eleven store
was open all night because the customers asked for it. This was the first 24-hour store in the industry.
More companies followed the practice . During the 80s, the company went through difficult times and
70% of the company was bought by Ito-Yokado, a Japanese company. In 2011, 7-Eleven celebrated
its 40,000th store opening and opened its 50,000th store within two years. Nowadays 7-Eleven is a
top Japanese-owned American International chain and the Thompsons still own about 5% of it.
